

This weekend of April 7 marks the 76th anniversary of the first attack on the city by the Nazi air force. Outside of the raids on London, Belfast was one of the cities worst affected in the British Isles by Luftwaffe attacks during the Second World War.

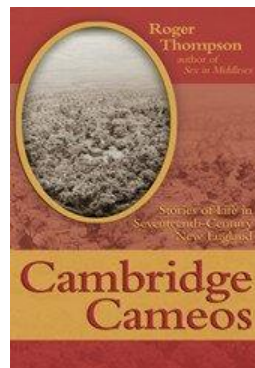
### 668,000 Pittsburgh, PA Cemetery Records Online
